Dealer Advice

Is your generator generating?

airflow and cooling of the engine.

It was the best of trips; it was the worst of trips... All too often this is the conversation around generators. Although they are a very depend-

able piece of machinery, they like a pet require attention.

How long has it been since you took your generator for a walk? What I mean by this is when is the last time you ran that generator? Like our pet a generator needs its exercise to keep it running in top shape. It is a good practice to start your generator once a month and let it run under a load for an hour. This is mainly to burn the aging fuel in the system and replace it with fresh fuel, but it also lubricates the internal engine components, keeps the oil seals working, and gives the electrical components a workout. Most of the generator repairs brought into our shop are due to lack of use and or proper maintenance.

Is your pet in a safe environment? You should make sure the area around your genset is free of debris and obstructions. This will allow proper airflow in and around your generator to help it to run cool. Most RV generators are air cooled so ventilation is critical to the lifespan of the unit. Also be sure no combustibles are stored in the same compartment to prevent the possibility of a fire. If your generator has an enclosure, make sure it is not operated without the applicable covers in place as these are also critical for the

Can your pet breath? Just like a living creature, engines need air to breath. Every generator has an air filter that should be clean and free of lubricants. You can check this by removing the filter, holding it up to a bright light or the sun, and you should see the glow of light through the paper filter. If you can't it is time for a new one. A clean unclogged filter will give you the best performance and fuel economy from your generators engine. Also on most generators there is an altitude adjustment on the carburetor that will change the air/fuel mixture for the altitude you are operating it in.

Does your pet get enough food? Your RV generator has a dirty little secret, it has oil in it. Like any other engine, the oil level is important. Most generators have an oil level switch that will shut the genset down if it reaches the critical low level to protect the engine from damage. This is a safety feature and does not negate the need to check the oil level. The oil level should be checked daily during use. It should also be checked before that trip to insure it will work when you need it. The oil and filter should be changed every 250 hours or annually whichever comes first.

These few simple things will decide weather your generator is dog tired or will purr like a kitten when you need it. Remember like your pet, your generator needs loving too, so take it out for some exercise.

CLEANING RV ROOFS

RUDY'S TIPS

We urge RV owners to get their roofs cleaned at least twice a year. This helps prevent damaging substances from getting too embedded and creating permanent stains. It also will help you avoid mold and mildew that grow on organic matter attached to your roof. Since many people park their RVs under trees for extended periods of time, your roof can be a ripe target for bird droppings, mulberry stains, tree sap, mold, mildew, fungus and the like.

There are many RV service centers that will do roof cleaning, so you don't need to do any climbing or roof walking yourself. If you do, I advise washing it from the sides, using ladders and scaffolding (see sections on roof safety).





Use the right cleaner it's important!

Use an appropriate cleaner for the type of roof and the type of stains you are trying to remove. It is crucial to follow the manufacturer's recommendations. For example, many RVs have EPDM rubber roofs that react badly with any cleaner containing petroleum distillates or citric-based chemicals. The rubber reacts to such distillates by swelling up. These chemicals may also discolor the roof. The swelling can loosen the attachment of the rubber material to the substrate and compromise the integrity of the roofing.

Dicor Products offers a specially formulated cleaner for EPDM and other kinds of roofs, such as TPO, fiberglass and aluminum. This cleaner safely loosens the dirt from the roof and works well on dirt, mold, bird droppings and all kinds of pollutants.

Caution when using cleaners

When cleaning an RV roof, as you rinse it off, the cleaner and dirt will run down the sides and caps of the RV. The rinse can also create dirt streaks down the sides of the RV and, if not quickly addressed, the dirt can start to permanently embed into the RV (see Black Streaks, Page 5).

For these reasons, I recommend masking off the sidewalls and caps from the roof edge down to prevent the rinse runoff from touching them. It's a bit more work at the beginning, but saves time in the actual cleaning process overall and you can ensure the protection of your expensive wall graphics.

What about tough stains?


Specialized roof cleaners can do a good job of cleaning tough stuff like mold and mulberries, but these substances can still leave a stain on the roofing material. Bleach or a bleach-based cleaner like Tilex® can remove these stains, but vou will have the same issue with the rinse-off affecting your graphics. Furthermore, the overuse of such cleaners can damage the rubber. So use only what's needed to get the stain out. A diluted

solution of three percent Hydrogen Peroxide is another tough cleaning agent, but more concentrated amounts also risk damaging a rubber roof. You can't be too careful using these specialized cleaners. This cleaning method runs the risk of damaging graphics.

Tree sap a special pain

Tree sap can be another difficult substance to completely get off your roof. The first thing to try is putting ice on it so the sap gets cold and loosens from its bond with the roof enough to enable you to actually peel it off.

If you have little success with this tactic, I would next try mineral spirits, but with a BIG CAUTION: Do NOT use mineral spirits unless you carefully follow these directions. Mineral

The owner of that dealership, graciously opened his lot, just for us to view his products later that Sunday evening. Now... this was a great unit by Forest River. Our finances were in place and the dealership made us an offer but it just didn't seem to be a good fit for us. I was so disappointed but knew there was more to this than "just buying" any 5th wheel. The days turned in to months, then the holiday's would come & go. By the beginning of 2016, I had become numb to looking at 5th wheels on line or on dealer lots. By the time March rolled around, I asked Dale if we could drive down to Tampa and visit a rather large dealership. We did and it was great! More types and brands than you could ever imagine on one lot. We found a particular unit that we liked (we won't mention the brand) but I wanted a 5th wheel and was ready to camp... so, we gave them a deposit. 




